Dear Friends,

Reflecting on 2018, we're amazed by the accomplishments of Southern Christian Services for Children and Youth, Inc. This year we reinvented our cornerstone program, PALS, creating Mississippi's first community-based homeless youth program; successfully navigated the funding changes within our independent living division, PREPARE, which deeply impacted how we implemented our mission; secured funding for a statewide evidenced-based trauma treatment program that allows us to provide trauma services to all children regardless of their family's ability to pay; and began a child abuse and neglect prevention division focused on decreasing the number of children falling into Mississippi's foster care system.

In addition to programmatic accomplishments, we improved our organizational health. We diversified funding streams, invested in employee training and focused on organizational depth trusting God would provide the width. Our 30th year of operations was significant and provided us with clarity, strength and mission-focused cohesion.

Although the organizational and programmatic accomplishments of 2018 were significant, they pale in comparison to the personal gains made by those we serve. Children and youth suffering from neglect, abandonment and abuse began healing. They completed trauma treatment, attached to adoptive families, reunited with biological families, graduated from high school, entered college, found long-term employment with health benefits, pulled themselves out of homelessness and addiction and are on the path to becoming self-sufficient contributing members of society.

On behalf of the children, youth and families impacted by Southern Christian Services, thank you for your generous support in 2018. Because of you, we were able to demonstrate the unconditional love of Christ to thousands of Mississippians. We are confident that when their journey through trauma and homelessness is over and joy is found, the children and youth we serve will look back and realize Jesus was with them all along; manifesting himself through our staff, volunteers and supporters. We are grateful for our dedicated Board of Directors and compassionate staff. We sincerely appreciate the generosity of our donors, community partners and volunteers. Together with God's help, we are rebuilding and strengthening lives.

Board of Directors

The Board of Directors is comprised of community leaders tasked with the duty of steering the organization toward advancing its mission. Each director dedicates his/her prayers, presence, gifts and service to Southern Christian Services for Children and Youth Inc. allowing Christ's love to be shared with thousands of Mississippians.

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Our Services

Therapeutic Residential Care

Therapeutic group homes provide family style living for children and youth who are unable to remain in their own homes because of abuse, neglect, serious behavioral, and/or emotional challenges.

- Harden House Therapeutic Group Home (Fulton) served 11 boys
- Joe Rowland Therapeutic Group Home (Grenada) served 12 boys

Therapeutic Foster Care and Adoption

Licensed TFC homes provide a temporary family for children and youth who are unable to remain in their own homes because of abuse, neglect, serious behavioral and/or emotional challenges.

Families who can make a permanent commitment to children and youth with special needs are trained and equipped to provide homes through adoption.

- 83% of children stayed in their original Southern Christian Services foster home until they were either adopted or successfully reunified with biological family
- 103 children and youth were served through our Therapeutic Foster Care program
- 23 adoptions were finalized
- 8 children were reunified with biological family

P.R.E.P.A.R.E. Independent Living

PREPARE is a statewide, community-based program that provides life skills training to older youth 14-20 years old who are in Mississippi's foster care system. This program includes readiness assessment, skills training groups, retreats, conferences and a transitional apartment living component.

- 716 foster care youth were served
- 163 emancipated youth received aftercare services

PALS Homeless Youth Program

Preparing Adolescents to Live Successfully is Mississippi's only community-based transitional living program for youth 18-23 years old certified by the Mississippi Department of Mental Health. This program is located in Jackson and specializes in assisting homeless youth in becoming self-sufficient and contributing members of society. While living at PALS, youth receive case management, educational support, employment assistance and evidenced-based counseling services. All PALS residents are either employed full-time or employed part-time while attending school.

- PALS remains at full capacity serving 5 youth with an array of services
- 3 youth are pursuing high school diplomas or college degrees
- 4 youth are employed at least part-time
- 1 youth is a full-time student at Jackson State University and completing a work study program on campus

Adoption Permanency and Respite

The purpose of this service is to support those families who've adopted through Mississippi's Foster Care system and prevent adoption disruptions. This is accomplished through providing information and referrals, crisis management, adoptive/foster parent and youth trainings, family and teen support groups and respite care services. Trained respite families offer foster and adoptive parents the opportunity for a break in times of crisis.

- 1034 nights of Respite care were provided
- 689 non-crisis referrals were managed by staff
- 30 Crisis Management cases were opened
- 412 children were served throughout Mississippi
- 823 Adoptive Families served throughout Mississippi

Looking to the Future Training Conference

Our annual conference is presented to hundreds of behavioral healthcare and social work professionals who work with children and youth. This year's conference was held at the Clyde Muse Center with Hind's County Community College and included presentations from national leaders in the fields of early childhood trauma, evidenced-based treatment models and cultural competency within the social service workplace.





God Wrote Our Story

When Steve and I were dating, I told him I felt God had called me to adopt older children instead of having my own biological children. This could have been a deal-breaker, but Steve was not opposed. After marriage and prayerful consideration, God affirmed the call to adopt in Steve. I began praying for my children's safety, and occasionally I would feel God telling me to pray specifically for them at certain times. When we built our home, Steve and I spent hours writing scripture on the floors and the studs about God's love for us, how He calls us to care for the orphans and how He has a plan for every life. On the day we were praying and writing scripture, I distinctly felt the upstairs bedroom overlooking the backyard would be for a sweet young girl and the front bedroom was being reserved for a sweet young boy.

After eight years of marriage, we both agreed that God was prompting us to start the adoption process and we contacted Southern Christian Services. We specifically prayed that God would make it very clear which children He'd chosen for us. We received a few calls that were very clearly not a match. But one day I noticed a missed call from Tana, who recruits families and matches children for Southern Christian Services. I knew the moment I saw her number THIS was the call. On the voicemail Tana said, "I think I found your children." Before calling her back I called Steve and told him, "Tana called about our kids!" Matthew was six years old, Caylin was eight years old and they were free for adoption. We were told about their history, mental health diagnoses and behavioral issues . . . but none of this scared us. God gave us complete peace.

The first time Steve and I met Matthew and Caylin was at Newk's. As they walked in with their social worker, Steve looked at me and said, "Yep, those are my kids." They even looked like us! God continued to confirm they were the children He'd chosen for us. When our visit at Newk's was over, Steve and I knew they would be back. According to their social worker,

the next step would be a weekend visit, then a longer visit, then the final placement. We expected the entire placement process to take a month or so. But shortly after planning the weekend visit, we received a call from the social worker saying the kids had to be moved immediately. Instead of having the weekend visit, we were asked if the kids could just move in. We had 48 hours to get our home prepared for children.

Our world came to screeching halt as we transformed into a family of four overnight. We were not (and still are not) equipped but, "God doesn't call the equipped, He equips the called." Parenting kids from trauma sometimes looks different. It looks like more rules and restrictions, more structure and a set schedule for meals. It looks like saying "no" when other parents get to say "yes" because your kids have different limitations. It looks like early bed times, extra naps, therapy and tutoring. It looks like managing anxiety and fear. It looks like hurtful comments, hard questions, grief and pain. But God gives us beauty from ashes, gladness from mourning and praise from a spirit of despair. He also surrounds us with the people we need at the perfect time. He gives us provision and guidance each step of the way. And we pray. A lot.

Caylin and Matthew became permanent members of the Simmons Family on May 7, 2018. Over the past year and a half, we've experienced all of the "firsts" – first Christmas, first birthdays together, all of the holidays, first day of school, lost teeth, first time on the honor roll, first Father/Daughter Dance, and our first family vacation. Our time together has been packed full of celebrations, changes, and figuring out what it means to be a family.

I wish I could say that once Caylin and Matthew were placed in our home, or even once they were adopted, all of their troubles magically resolved. But they did not. There were days in the beginning when we thought we couldn't do it. But we learned we were never meant to do anything in our own strength; we need to rely on God for all things. We still struggle

with some issues because of the kids' history, but it gets better every day. Our kids have worked so hard in therapy, at school, and at home. They are not the same children who walked into our home 18 months ago and we are not the same adults. For that I am grateful. God has grown us, changed us, and shaped us into better people who are fully dependent on Him.

God has continued to affirm that He chose Matthew and Caylin for us long before any of us were born. We now know the times we felt led to pray for our future children and the times we had conversations about whether it was time to adopt, were around the times Caylin and Matthew were born. They were taken into CPS custody the same month we wrote scripture on our house floors and prayed for them. Their biological parents' rights were terminated the same month we wrote on our pledge card at church that we planned to "make room" by adopting two children. At our first doctor's appointment with them, the doctor told us that Matthew was projected to be 6'4" – Steve's height and Caylin was projected to be 5'7" – my height. His handwriting is all over our story.



One Couple's Love

One night a lovely lady turned to her husband and said, "Lewis, wouldn't it be nice to foster a child again? I've been getting kinda lonely, just you, the dogs and me. We've done it once before, let's take another under our wing." Her husband had no argument and very soon, the couple got a call that a little boy needed a room. She drove to meet the boy she would bring into her home. What she was getting into, 'Oh, how could she have known!'

When meeting his family, something caught her eye, one girl would laugh hysterically and then begin to cry. The eldest of the family came over to say, "Hi!" She was taken aback by what she saw in the girl's eyes. The eyes belonged to one much older than her age. Within those hazel-gray eyes, pain and sadness raged. She looked at them and said, "I'll give it a whirl". And to home she took, the boy and two girls.

The first night that they stayed, it is hard to describe, but the couple were relieved when the children said, "Goodnight!" And as the lady's niece was leaving out the door, she turned to her and said, "Aunt Sheila, are you sure?"

The next few months were rocky though the couple really tried. The middle child often woke up in the night and cried and cried. Consoled she would not be and they feared "goodbye" to an institution she would be sent and there she would spend her life. However, that was not to be, with prayers and patience, the couple persevered And soon laughter replaced the tears.

The youngest child was wild, as wild as can be, as he ran through the house with endless energy. Breaking everything in his path, nothing safe from his wrath, but the couple's love remained steadfast. They worked with him endlessly, teaching him right from wrong. The young boy went from wild to calm.



The oldest, living mostly in her dreams, had a tendency to .. well... SCREAM! Lost in a world of her own she would stay, and whispering in the night, you could hear her say, "I want to go home and not be here, because a life lived in fear, is better than something new and unclear." But she soon came to realize that her past life was a lie and she had to move forward and risk giving life a try. With the help of the couple she soon learned to trust. And, especially, learned that honesty is a must. She came out of the darkness, the abuse and fear, in which, she spent so many young years. And as she did, her foster parents held her and dried her tears.

Now here we are, almost three years later, in that happy home, and the children want the name of 'Havens' and that alone.

The youngest, an artist, drawing stars, stripes and prisms. And he's doing well in school despite his Autism. The middle child, a violinist, and oh how you should hear her play. She plays "Amazing Grace" in the most beautiful way. The oldest child a writer, writing stories, poetry and drama. She is now proud to call her foster-parents "Daddy and Momma".

The three have grown in stature, body and mind. And I assure they are doing better than just fine. They have found their place, in school they make straight A's All this happen all because of the love one couple gave.

I can attest that this story is true Because I am the one it happened too.

A Note from Aaron

Dear Friends:

My name is Aaron. I am 16 years old and a junior at Grenada High School. I want you to know that Southern Christian Services has helped me work through a lot of trauma from my past. When I had to be removed from my previous foster home for safety reasons, Southern Christian Services was there to take me safely to the Joe Rowland Boys Home. I came to Joe Rowland on January 24, 2018. To you, this might seem like a short while, but a lot has happened to me in this short time. At Rowland I have a family. Many of you might take family for granted. I don't. I KNOW what it feels like to have no family. Since I came to Rowland, my father figure is Mr. Greg, the Residential Director. My mother figure is Ms. Joyce, the Clinical Director. My aunts and uncles are the staff at Rowland. And the other residents at the boy's home are my brothers. These folks make sure I'm fed, (Mr. Horton is the best griller in the state of Mississippi). I get clothed, (Mr. Hill knows where to get the best buy on some new kicks). I get to school on time, get to church, get to other fun and even educational events and it's all good because Joe Rowland staff make sure I get everywhere I need to be. Mr. Joel, the Residential Life Coordinator had us all over Mississippi this summer. We visited at least six college campuses. This was good thing since I'm a high school junior. I was able to see some of my college options. Anyway, what I think is really good about this year is I found a new church. I am active in the church band. I am active in bible study and gave my life to Christ. I'm on senior level so I get special privileges. And one of the best things that happened since being at Rowland is staff found me a mentor family. My mentor family is a husband and wife team that have taken me under their wing. They go to my church. This would not and could not have happened if not for the folks at Joe Rowland really caring about me. So, now my life belongs to Jesus and I've got a family that has my

back. What more could I ask for? You are the reason that places like Joe Rowland Home can be a blessing to kids like me. Kids that need a home, kids that, if it were not for you, many of us would be on the streets or with abusive families. It's people like you that make it possible for me to have a fairly normal life. I'm happy. My future is hopeful. I have plans to go to college or the military when I leave Joe Rowland in a year. I'm in JROTC right now. Ms. Joyce encouraged me to look into this. So you see I'm not so sure I would have my head on straight if I had to worry about where my next meal would come from or who is going to make sure I get to the doctor if I'm sick, or who is going to make sure I get to that after school program I want to be in. My Rowland family makes sure this all gets taken care of for me. Take it from me, when you support Southern Christian Services, you are helping Joe Rowland take good care of me. And when you help foster kids you are doing God's will. James Chapter 1 and verse 27 from the NIV Bible reads "Religion that God our father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."
